

Understanding Your Study Guide

Here is a brief explanation of the features of this study guide.

LOOKING AHEAD / CATCHING UP

You will open each meeting by briefly discussing a question or two that will help focus everyone's attention on the subject of the lesson.

DISCOVERY QUESTIONS

Each video segment is complemented by three questions for group discussion. There is no reason to rush through the answers. Give everyone ample opportunity to share their thoughts.

PRAYER DIRECTION

At the end of each session you, will find suggestions for your group prayer time. Praying together is one of the greatest privileges of small group life. Please don't take it for granted.

PARTING SUGGESTIONS

At the end of each session you will find two suggestions for consideration throughout the week.



Three questions to consider in the desert:

- How did I get here?
- What am I supposed to learn?
- When will I get out of here?

When God leads you into a desert, don't be in a hurry. If you rush your way through, you might miss something. There is a special beauty in the desert that is unlike anywhere else. The Bible says, "[God] has made everything beautiful in its time" (Ecclesiastes 3:11 NIV).

Let your desert prayer be, "God, you can take as long as you need because I don't want to go through this again. I want to learn the lesson the first time."

How long you spend in the desert, to a great extent, depends on you. God wants to see if you will remain faithful to what is right and true.

Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.

Galatians 6:9 (NIV)

In all things God works for the good of those who love him.

Romans 8:28 (NIV)

I have seen you in the sanctuary and beheld your power and your glory. ³Because your love is better than life, my lips will glorify you. ⁴I will praise you as long as I live, and in your name I will lift up my hands. ⁵My soul will be satisfied as with the richest of foods; with singing lips my mouth will praise you. ⁶On my bed I remember you; I think of you through the watches of the night.

Psalm 63:2-6 (NIV)

What do you think about through the watches of the night? When sleep eludes you and you find yourself staring at the ceiling or pacing the floor, do what David did: Take an inventory. Remember what God has already done for you. Think about his love and faithfulness:

- How has he provided for you?
- How has he protected you?
- How did you first meet him?
- How has he answered your prayers in the past?

Don't focus on the prayers he has not answered yet. Instead, think about what God has already done in your life. It will build your faith for your current situation. Instead of blowing your worries out of proportion, it will bring everything into a perspective of faith.

Because you are my help, I sing in the shadow of your wings.

Psalm 63:7 (NIV)

Begin to fill your world with songs of faith and worship.

My soul clings to you; your right hand upholds me.

Psalm 63:8 (NIV)

If you remember him, think of him, and sing to him, it will help your soul cling to him in the darkest hours of your desert experience. I can't tell you how long your season in the desert will last, but I can tell you this: Don't give up hope. God has not abandoned you. He promises in his Word, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5b NKJV).


- 1. As you begin your group prayer time, spend a few minutes thanking God for his faithfulness and for the lessons he has taught you in your soul deserts.
- 2. Pray for anyone in your group who is currently in a desert of the soul.


Parting Suggestions

When we think of God leading us, we tend to think of him taking us to greater and greater heights of spiritual accomplishment—always upward, never down, always forward, never backward. But that is simply not the case. Psalm 23 tells us that sometimes the Shepherd leads us right through the Valley of the Shadow of Death.

If you are following Christ and you find yourself in a desert, it's very likely that God led you there, just like he led Abraham, Moses, Elijah, and Jesus into their deserts. It's because he wants to say something to you, and there is no other place you will hear it. The desert is God's way of getting your attention.

"Therefore I am now going to allure her; I will lead her into the desert and speak tenderly to her.

15 There I will give her back her vineyards, and will make the Valley of Achor a door of hope. There she will sing as in the days of her youth, as in the day she came up out of Egypt. 16 In that day," declares the Lord, "you will call me 'my husband'; you will no longer call me 'my master.' 17 I will remove the names of the Baals from her lips; no longer will their names be invoked . . . 21 In that day I will respond," declares the Lord. "I will [sing] to the skies, and they will [sing] to the earth; 22 and the earth will [sing] to the grain, the new wine and oil, and they will [sing] to [my people]."

Hosea 2:14–18, 21–22 (NIV)

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When God wants to bring you into something new, he first has to bring you out of something old. And very often, the passageway from the old into the new goes through a valley of trouble. It involves sorrow and difficulty. But God says in Hosea 2 that your valley of trouble is not a dead end. It's a doorway into a place of hope, fruitfulness, and restoration.

We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; ⁹persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed.

Your trouble is not a sentence. It is not the end. It is the beginning of a much greater story.

So which side of the comma are you living on? Are you living on the troubled side or the trusting side?

We do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. ¹⁷For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. ¹⁸So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

Your desert may seem like a place of desolation, but God will make it a place of restoration. It may seem like a place of barrenness, but God will make it a place of fruitfulness. God will not abandon you in the desert. He will turn your Valley of Achor into a door of hope.

- Between now and your next small group meeting, memorize the Bible verse that was most meaningful to you in this session, and make it the focal point of your daily devotions this week.



FIVE THINGS YOU CAN DO TO PREPARE THE WAY FOR THE LORD

Clutter, noise, and meaningless activities can be unnecessary distractions. There just might be too much going on in your life—too many yeses, too many commitments—you're spreading yourself too thin. In the desert seasons you have to carefully parcel out your resources. You must learn to say no. Categorize everything into what's important and what's not important. Only do the important things so you can focus more attention on God.

Every act of service, no matter how small, can have eternal consequences. The question of significance is not yours to answer. But the question of faithfulness is entirely within your control. Will you be faithful in the little things? One small act of faithfulness can grow into an epic story.

God's greatest gifts are not placed on the highest shelf where they can only be reached through superior acts of spiritual accomplishment or advanced levels of religious education. Indeed, God's greatest gifts are placed on the bottom shelf, and in order to reach them, we must get on our knees.

Helps for Hosts

TOP TEN IDEAS FOR NEW HOSTS

CONGRATULATIONS! As the host of your small group, you have responded to the call to help shepherd Jesus' flock. Few other tasks in the family of God surpass the contribution you will be making. As you prepare to facilitate your group, whether it is one session or the entire series, here are a few thoughts to keep in mind.

Remember you are not alone. God knows everything about you, and he knew you would be asked to facilitate your group. Even though you may not feel ready, this is common for all good hosts. God promises, "I will never leave you; I will never abandon you" (Hebrews 13:5b GNT). Whether you are facilitating for one evening, several weeks, or a lifetime, you will be blessed as you serve.

- 1. **Don't try to do it alone.** Pray right now for God to help you build a healthy team. If you can enlist a co-host to help you shepherd the group, you will find your experience much richer. This is your chance to involve as many people as you can in building a healthy group. All you have to do is ask people to help. You'll be surprised at the response.
- 2. **Be friendly and be yourself.** God wants to use your unique gifts and temperament. Be sure to greet people at the door with a big smile. This can set the mood for the whole gathering. Remember, they are taking as big a step to show up at your house as you are to host a small group! Don't try

- to do things exactly like another host; do them in a way that fits you. Admit when you don't have an answer and apologize when you make a mistake. Your group will love you for it and you'll sleep better at night.
- 3. **Prepare for your meeting ahead of time.** Preview the session and write down your responses to each question.
- 4. **Pray for your group members by name.** Before your group arrives, take a few moments and pray for each member by name. You may want to review the **Small Group Prayer and Praise Report** at least once a week. Ask God to use your time together to touch the heart of each person in your group. Expect God to lead you to whomever he wants you to encourage or challenge in a special way. If you listen, God will surely lead.
- 5. When you ask a question, be patient. Someone will eventually respond. Sometimes people need a moment or two of silence to think about the question. If silence doesn't bother you, it won't bother anyone else. After someone responds, affirm the response with a simple "thanks" or "great answer." Then ask, "How about somebody else?" or "Would someone who hasn't shared like to add anything?" Be sensitive to new people or reluctant members who aren't ready to say, pray, or do anything. If you give them a safe setting, they will blossom over time. If someone in your group is a wallflower who sits silently through every session, consider talking to them privately and encouraging them to participate. Let them know how important they are to you—that they are loved and appreciated, and that the group would value their input. Remember, still water often runs deep.

- 6. **Provide transitions between questions.** Ask if anyone would like to read the paragraph or Bible passage. Don't call on anyone, but ask for a volunteer, and then be patient until someone begins. Be sure to thank the person who reads aloud.
- 7. **Break into smaller groups occasionally.** With a greater opportunity to talk in a small circle, people will connect more with the study, apply more quickly what they're learning, and ultimately get more out of their small group experience. A small circle also encourages a quiet person to participate and tends to minimize the effects of a more vocal or dominant member.
 - 8. Small circles are also helpful during prayer time. People who are unaccustomed to praying aloud will feel more comfortable trying it with just two or three others. Also, prayer requests won't take as much time, so circles will have more time to actually pray. When you gather back with the whole group, you can have one person from each circle briefly update everyone on the prayer requests from their subgroups. The other great aspect of subgrouping is that it fosters leadership development. As you ask people in the group to facilitate discussion or to lead a prayer circle, it gives them a small leadership step that can build their confidence.
 - 9. **Rotate facilitators occasionally.** You may be perfectly capable of hosting each time, but you will help others grow in their faith and gifts if you give them opportunities to host the group.

10. One final challenge (for new or first-time hosts). Before your first opportunity to lead, look up each of the six passages listed below. Read each one as a devotional exercise to help prepare you with a shepherd's heart. Trust us on this one. If you do this, you will be more than ready for your first meeting.

Matthew 9:36-38 (NIV)

When [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. ³⁸Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

John 10:14-15 (NIV)

I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me—¹⁵just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep.

1 Peter 5:2-4 (NIV)

Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, serving as overseers—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; 3not greedy for money, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. 4And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away.

Philippians 2:1–5 (NIV)

If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, ²then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. ³Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. ⁴Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. ⁵Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus.

Hebrews 10:23-25 (NIV)

Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. ²⁴And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. ²⁵Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

1 Thessalonians 2:7–8, 11–12 (NIV)

... but we were gentle among you, like a mother caring for her little children. ⁸We loved you so much that we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well, because you had become so dear to us. . . . ¹¹For you know that we dealt with each of you as a father deals with his own children, ¹²encouraging, comforting and urging you to live lives worthy of God, who calls you into his kingdom and glory.

Frequently Asked Questions

How long will this group meet?

This study is four sessions long. We encourage your group to add a fifth session for a celebration. In your final session, each group member may decide if he or she desires to continue on for another study. At that time, you may also want to do some informal evaluation, discuss your **Group Guidelines** (see page 60), and decide which study you want to do next. We recommend you visit our website at **www.saddlebackresources.com** for more video-based small group studies.

Who is the host?

The host is the person who coordinates and facilitates your group meetings. In addition to a host, we encourage you to select one or more group members to lead your group discussions. Several other responsibilities can be rotated, including refreshments, prayer requests, worship, or keeping up with those who miss a meeting. Shared ownership in the group helps everybody grow.

WHERE DO WE FIND NEW GROUP MEMBERS?

Recruiting new members can be a challenge for groups, especially new groups with just a few people, or existing groups that lose a few people along the way. We encourage you to use the **Circles of Life** diagram on page 62 of this study guide to brainstorm a list of people from your workplace, church, school, neighborhood, family, and so on. Then pray for the people on each member's list. Allow each member to invite several people from their list. Some groups fear that newcomers will interrupt the intimacy that members have built over time. However, groups that welcome newcomers generally gain strength with the infusion of new blood. Remember, the next person you add just might become a friend for eternity. Logistically, groups find different ways to add members. Some groups remain permanently open, while others choose to open periodically, such as at the beginning or end of a study. If your group becomes too large for easy, face-to-face conversations, you can subgroup, forming a second discussion group in another room.

How do we handle the childcare needs in our group?

Childcare needs must be handled very carefully. This is a sensitive issue. We suggest you seek creative solutions as a group. One common solution is to have the adults meet in the living room and share the cost of a baby sitter (or two) who can be with the kids in another part of the house. Another popular option is to have one home for the kids and a second home (close by) for the adults. If desired, the adults could rotate the responsibility of providing a lesson for the kids. This last option is great with school-age kids and can be a huge blessing to families.

Group Guidelines

It's a good idea for every group to put words to their shared values, expectations, and commitments. Such guidelines will help you avoid unspoken agendas and unmet expectations. We recommend you discuss your guidelines during Session One in order to lay the foundation for a healthy group experience. Feel free to modify anything that does not work for your group.


